Monthly Recipe

Quick and Easy Pumpkin Dump Cake

29 Oz Canned Pumpkin
12 Oz Evaporated Milk
1Cup Granulated Sugar
1 1/2 tsp Cinnamon or Pumpkin Pie Spice
1/2 tsp ginger
3 Eggs beaten
1(18 Oz) box French Vanilla Cake Mix or Spice Cake Mix
3/4 Cup Butter, Melted

Grease Bottom of 9x13 inch pan.
Combine 1st 6 ingredients.
Pour into Pan.
Sprinkle, then pack cake mix over top evenly.
Drizzle Butter over entire cake.
Bake at 350 F for approx 50-60 minutes (test for doneness).
For extra elegance top with slices of whipped cream sprinkled with the spices used in cake

The Forgotten Victims of Hurricane Katrina By Tracey Beverly

On August 29, 2005 Hurricane Katrina slammed into New Orleans, Possibly resulting in the largest hurricane of its strength ever recorded. The already deteriorated levee system that protected New Orleans from Lake Pontchartrain and the Mississippi River was breached in the storm subsequently flooding the city. Thousands were killed as a direct result of the storm and several others died from the flooding and toxic water. The damage is estimated to be from \$100 to \$200 billion, at least double from previously most expensive Hurricane Andrew making Katrina the most expensive natural disaster in U.S. History. Over a Million people were displaced— a humanitarian crisis on a scale unseen in the U.S. since the Great Depression.

Local people have known for years , for generations , that one day , sooner or later, the levees will be breached and the city will be a disaster area— a 500 year old flood scenario. Whatever plans and preparations the city, state, and federal authorities have made for this are about to be tested. What became abundantly clear is that no considerations had been made concerning the fate of the family pet. Nobody expected what followed— the flooding of a whole city— a government in chaos— tens of thousands of "as

city— a government in chaos— tens of thousands of animals abandoned— rescuers stopped from entering the city to do their job— a lake of toxic chemicals and sewage— dogs and cats stranded on the roofs of cars and porches, or left locked up in homes, for weeks on end.



Within 24 hours after Hurricane Katrina made landfall, Best Friends' director of operations< Paul Berry, was on the scene in New Orleans to assess the damage there and determine what kind of help could be offered through the Best Friends Network of members and volunteers. Berry set up the Best

Friends' hurricane relief center outside Tylertown at the St. Francis Animal Sanctuary and organized Best Friends rescue operations there for the first three weeks. He then spent a few days in San Antonio, assessing the needs of the animals during the evacuation of Houston as Hurricane Rita was approaching the Texas coast.

"There were really two disasters", Paul later recalled. "First, the natural disaster. And second, the response from the authorities, which was even more catastrophic." For animals all across the city, a terrible drama is now about to unfold. Tens of thousands of animals have already been left behind. Tens of thousands more are about to be abandoned as people are instructed by the authorities to evacuate without them. They are all going to be trapped or stranded for what may be days or weeks or months. And for those who have been trusting the government and following their instructions, it's been heartbreaking. These folks have lost every-

thing— their homes, their possessions, their jobs— and now, as they board buses at pickup points along the freeway to be taken out of town, they're being told to leave Fido or Fluffy at the side of the road. So the last they see of New Orleans, as they looks back out of the bus window, is their beloved pet gazing helplessly at them or chasing the bus until they collapse, exhausted on



the highway. We cannot allow a situation to again. On September 22, Reps. Tom Lantos (D-Calf) and Christopher Shays (R-Conn) introduced the Pets Evacuation and Transportation Standards Act into Congress. The PETS bill would require the government to include animals in the future emergency evacuation plans.

What is even more heartbreaking about situations like this

is that these dogs and cat survivors have fought off star-"as they vation and dehydration for weeks on end. Their will to live look back is part of what has inspired totally exhausted volunteer out of the rescuers to keep going back for more, day after day. Paddling or wading to a house, Risking serious injury and braving toxic waters that could latterly burst into flames at is their any given moment, to bring in these animals who are beloved pet clinging to life by a thread only to have the animal put on the list for "euthanizing" when their owner cannot be congazing helplessly at

them"

The devastating of Hurricane Katrina has been horrifying, but the loss of all the pets could have been avoided. Please do not forget the forgotten victims of this terrible tragedy.

Several organizations are accepting donations and volunteers to reunite these pets with their owners. Lets do what we can to save the remaining animals and fix this appalling oversight of the government to consider the pets we love so dearly.

Best Friends Animal Sanctuary, in Utah, is the nations largest for abused and abandoned animals, home on any given day to about 1,500 homeless dogs, cats, and other animals that come from shelters all over the country. Statewide Training—Vincennes

On Saturday December 10th, we were honored to have a Statewide Training event offered in Vincennes. Mike McDowell ,Shannon Simpson, Dan and Val Wilburn, and Mary Ellen Hammack were our knowledgeable instructors and the following classes were offered:

- *101 Ghost Hunting is required to do investigations. Part of the BASIC building blocks of conducting a paranormal investigation.
- *102 Equipment is required to do investigations. Part of the BASIC building blocks of conducting a paranormal investigation. Teaches basic equipment usage.
- *103 Live investigations is an application of the knowledge learned in the 101 & 102 classes. This is required for all those who have just taken a training class.
- *115 The Etheric body The Etheric body and EMF field are among the topics we look at here as we examine what a ghost is made up of and how the equipment we use detects them.
- *130 Psychic Protection An essential class which teaches members how to deal with overwhelming conditions of negative ghosts and other entities.
- *135 Dowsing and Pendulums discusses how to use dowsing rods and pendulums during an investigation. Hands on training will be used.
- *140 EVP Training is a class on learning how to capture and analyze the sounds captured.
- *150 Advanced Photography "In search of dust orbs" deals with the harsh realities of photography as it relates to paranormal investigations.
- *201 Advanced Training deals with deeper topics that paranormal investigators should know. This class helps define you as an investigator and helps fill in the gaps on information that you may need on doing investigations. If you have been a long time member you may know a great deal of this material already.
- *205 Interviewing Techniques covers basic facts about conducting investigative interviews.
- *210 Public Relations is a basic look at IGT promotion ideas and campaigns. We'll look at advertising and talk about dealing with the media. This class is encouraged for anyone thinking of helping with PR in the Indiana Ghost Trackers.
- *215 Management training discusses ideas on how to effectively lead people without BURNOUT. This is a great class for team leaders and other officers in IGT.
- *230 Psychic Ghost Hunting Learning to use your natural abilities to investigate the paranormal. Tuning and procedure as to how to do an investigation as a sensitive or psychic are covered.
